How to save a life

Voice over speaker: Hey, are you okay? What do we do? What do we do?

Kyle: Hey everybody, I'm Kyle, and I'm going to be your substitute teacher today.

What you guys just walked into was two friends finding another friend overdose.

I used to be a drug dealer.

Our friend here was just looking for a stimulant to stay awake in school. The sad reality is, fentanyl is being mixed into everything now.

ON SCREEN SUPER:

Fentanyl is a powerful opioid 50x strong than heroin.

It can be made illegally & is mixed into drugs and made into fake pills

Kyle: So, it's better to be safe than sorry and know what to do if you find yourself in this situation.

You want to look for the signs and symptoms of an overdose.

Real pale skin, blue fingertips, blue face, no breathing or really slow breathing, no pulse, really slow pulse, and unresponsive.

ON SCREEN SUPER:

Signs and symptoms of an overdose may include:

- Pale Skin
- Blue Fingertips
- Blue Face
- No/Slow Breathing
- No/Slow Pulse
- Unresponsive

Kyle: Get 911 on the phone, get the emergency responders there, on their way.

ON SCREEN SUPER:

CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY

Kyle: They have put laws into effect know where it doesn't matter if you're at a party, if you're in the car, doesn't matter where you are, if you call the police because someone is overdosing and there is drugs or drug paraphernalia, you will not get in to trouble. Same with the person who is overdosing.

ON SCREEN SUPER:

Most states have 'Good Samaritan Laws'

Which means you can call 911 if there's a drug overdose without fear of getting in trouble with the Law*

*Varies by state

Kyle: What we're going to do is we're going to go through step by step exactly what you should do if you find yourself in that situation.

ON SCREEN SUPER:

After calling 911 here's what you can do

Kyle: There's only one thing that will save somebody's life, and that is naloxone nasal spray.

ON SCREEN SUPER:

Naloxone is a medicine that can rapidly reverse an opioid overdose

Kyle: What you wanna do is get the person on the floor, pull on the back of their head very gently, what you're trying to do is you want their head to tilt up a little bit what this is going to do is open up their air way

So now we pull out our naloxone nasal spray

You're going to insert it into their nostril

And press down the plunger

This is going to give them a full dose

After that, roll them over into a recovery position

Student 1: How do you get that nasal spray?

Kyle: Most pharmacies you can get it, they give it out at a lot of different events, they give it out at the police station.

Anybody and everybody should have this on hand.

ON SCREEN SUPER:

You can get naloxone at most pharmacies, police stations, healthcare providers, and similar places

Student 2: Realizing that I could've been in that situation where I could've actually been that mannequin that we were trying to save...

Student 3: I think we need to be more educated so that we can inform more people and stop letting teenagers die

Student 1: It's a very heavy topic, but I felt better that I know this and I can help someone or save someone

Student 4: Out of all the other subjects I felt that this was the most important because it teaches you how to save a life.
